Catholic Schools' Trustees Service



Introduction

The Catholic Trustees, comprising Diocesan Bishops, Religious Congregations and Lay Trustees, are responsible for the defining mission, ethos and ownership of 489 maintained special, nursery, primary and secondary schools as well as 29 Voluntary Grammar Schools in Northern Ireland. This represents some 43.4% of the school estate. In 2016/17, some 150,253 pupils were enrolled in schools managed by Catholic Trustees, representing 44% of the school-going population and making Catholic managed schools the largest school sector in Northern Ireland.

Trustees have responsibility for decisions relating to all aspects of the property and buildings of Catholic schools, including complex and resource intensive financial, legal, planning, procurement, maintenance, disposal and other responsibilities.

Trustees have continuous oversight of the strategic direction, organisational nature and collective ethos of the whole Catholic school sector. This includes responsibility to provide cohesive and professionally informed support to Catholic schools in key areas of Department policy such as shared education, jointly-managed Church schools, community use of schools, local community outreach and engagement, promoting good relations, cross-sectoral planning, procurement, expansion, enhancement and closure of schools, raising standards and post-primary transfer.

Who we Are and what we do

The Catholic Schools' Trustee Service (CSTS) provides The Trustees with a professional support body to assist them in carrying out their responsibilities within the network of Catholic managed schools in Northern Ireland.

CSTS, as a sectoral support body for Catholic schools, will seek to develop systems in support of all Catholic school Trustees.

The role of the CSTS is to:

- provide appropriate advice and support to the Trustees in developing and promoting, at all levels, the ethos of Catholic education, based on the personal teaching and witness of Jesus Christ;
- support the Trustees in promoting the ethos of Catholic-managed schools, through the provision of advice and guidance to Governors and Principals;
- provide professional support and advice to the Trustees in respect of area planning for the Catholic Managed Schools' sector on the basis of agreed protocols with CCMS, EA

and *DE* and mindful of the new role of Local District Councils in community planning for schools;

- assist the Trustees in engaging with other Churches in developing arrangements for 'Jointly-Managed' Church schools as envisaged in Department Circular 2015/15;
- assist the Trustees in their commitment to developing the role of Catholic schools in shared education.
- assist the Trustees in working with all Catholic schools to develop more cohesive engagement within the sector in response to Department policy in areas such as shared education, area planning and post-primary transfer.

Strategic Context

CSTS is a key sectoral support body playing a significant role in its contribution to shaping current and future educational provision in Northern Ireland. At a time of rapid change within society in Northern Ireland and the increased pressures on public finances the CSTS seeks to represent the interests of Trustees in promoting the ethos of Catholic Education within the education system in Northern Ireland. As a key sector, the role of CSTS is vital to the promotion and growth of this sector which is based on a vision and values central to the development of a well-rounded society and responsible citizens with an inclusive and caring outlook on life.
